
CYBER-CRIME AND ONLINE FRAUD

Cyber-crime and online fraud are increasing all the time. They now account for 53% of ALL crime committed in this country, and last year losses amounted to £190 billion. In Northamptonshire alone, 6000 victims lost over £20 million, of which £6 million was lost through phone fraud. Only 15% of these crimes are reported, mainly because of embarrassment, but fraudsters are very good at what they do, so don't be embarrassed if you fall victim.

Update your passwords regularly, using 12 characters or any three random words. Where possible use 2 factor authentication which makes you 800 times more secure. If you think you have been a victim, report it to Action Fraud on 0300 1232040 or online to actionfraud.police.uk

Please forward any scam text messages to 7726 and report any phishing emails To SERS at ncsc.gov.uk/collection/phishing-scams and they can shut those websites down.

Colin Spickett has arranged a presentation about online fraud by Northamptonshire Police, in the New Year in the village hall, and will put details in the Chronicle nearer the time.

This simple, free system allows people to sign up to receive messages from Northamptonshire Police and partners such as Neighbourhood Watch by email.

This can range from information about crime prevention, local issues and engagement events and it helps promote confidence and better engagement between Northamptonshire Police and the communities it serves.

Neighbourhood Alert is a great way to keep in touch and we are keen to work with stakeholders to reach as wide an audience as possible.

RING FOR THE KING

For hundreds of years church bells have rung out, not only to call communities to worship, but also to celebrate special occasions, in remembrance of others and to signify special events. They are part of the soundscape of the UK.



In June 2022 we all celebrated Queen Elizabeth II's Platinum Jubilee, some of us with the sound of bells. Bells also rang out with a muffled sound throughout the nation as a mark of respect at her passing in September 2022.

Anyone can become a bell-ringer, no special skills are necessary. Ringers learn at different ages and come from many different walks of life. If you are sufficiently coordinated to catch a ball, you should be able to learn to ring. Ringers are able to follow instructions.

The first stage in learning to ring is to develop the skills to 'handle' the bell. That means the technique to control the bell using the rope. This is done on a one-to-one basis with your trained instructor.

You will be taught each of the two movements called 'strokes' separately and then helped to put them together. The technique is all about holding the rope correctly, moving with it and catching the rope at the right place and time.
