BELL RINGING AT ST ANDREW, CRANSLEY 11TH NOVEMBER

The 6 bells at St Andrew Cransley were first cast in 1683 by Bagley's but 2 were reported as cracked as early as 1883. Despite these faults Cransley used to have a lively band of bell ringers. On every Remembrance Day we remember those who gave their lives in war conflict. During World War 1, Horace Sharman and George Holland, both bell ringers of renown in Cransley, both lost their lives in the conflict.

Due to the fund raising efforts of the villagers, during the late 1980's, enough money was raised to have the bells restored by The Whitechapel Bell foundry. Other work was done, often by the villagers themselves, to enhance the ringing experience. The bells were rededicated in January, 1992 and they are now regarded as some of the best ring of six in the county and the easiest to ring.

Bells are highly significant in the culture of the UK. So much so, that the Government has recently issued a National Directive to ring all bells throughout the land at 12:30 pm Sunday 11th November 2018. Cransley no longer has a 'resident' band, only some willing learners. Fortunately, neighbouring Rothwell is prepared to step into the breach and ring a muffled peal. If you've never heard muffled bells, then turn off all the usual noise and listen to the bells. The church and tower are built in a hollow and behind trees, so the sound may not carry too well nowadays but walk or drive along Church Lane to hear a once in a lifetime experience. You can then say "I was there".

BUS SERVICES

Since the Northampton County Council stopped the subsidy for the bus service there hasn't been, and will no longer be, any service coming through Great Cransley. The Parish Council was not informed of this.

11TH NOVEMBER 1918

GREAT CRANSLEY, NORTHAMPTONSHIRE

On the Eleventh hour of the Eleventh Day of the Eleventh Month in 1918, the Armistice was signed on the Allied Supreme Commander's private train, which was situated in a siding in the forest of Compiègne. The Allied supreme Commander Marshall Ferdinand Foch and his team actually signed the armistice document at 5 am on the eleventh, but the terms were that "all hostilities would end within 6 hours of the signing" ...hence 11 am.

After four years of fighting and the loss of over 37.5 million people together with 7 million maimed for life, there can have been few places if any, in the UK that had not been directly affected. Overall 57.6% of all combatants became casualties with the appalling record on the Western Front that 3,528,610 were killed and 7,745,900 wounded.

In 1914 the Cransley Estate was owned by Captain Arthur Hugh Thurnburn - a retired army officer who lived at Cransley Hall with his family. Thurnburn owned most of the houses, cottages and the majority of the land in the Parish, about 1860 acres. The estate employed a large number of people working on the land, in the gardens and woodlands. The other big employer in the village then was the Cransley Blast Furnaces (now Cransley Park off the A14) and Quarries for the ironstone ore. Many of these people lived in cottages owned by Thurnburn as well.

At the outbreak of war in 1914 each county of the UK was asked to promote recruitment, and in Northamptonshire this role was given to Captain Thurnburn, who was promoted to Major to give him the seniority the post required. He ran this scheme for the duration of the war. It is recorded that in the first 4 weeks of the war over 750,000 men volunteered in the UK, many of them thinking "it will all be over by Christmas".

We find it hard to imagine now, but at this time Great Britain had an Empire "On which the sun never set"... the map of the world was largely pink, and we commanded the largest and most powerful navy in the world - who could possibly challenge it! We thought we were invincible.

One can only imagine what happened, but I believe as county recruiting officer, Major Thurnburn would have wanted his own estate to set a good example.

Our memorial records the names of 17 men who died during the 14-18 War. It does not record the names of men who fought and returned ... many with terrible physical and mental scars and whose lives would never be the same again. Nor does the memorial record the suffering of mothers, fathers, siblings or wives and children who lost their loved ones in often unknown, unmarked locations, then buried in mass graves.

In 1919 it was soon realised that the public demanded that the great sacrifice must be forever recorded in every community. In Cransley, Major Thurnburn formed a committee

and donated the piece of land on which our Memorial was erected. It was designed by the Kettering Architects, Blackwell and Ridley, and made by the stonemasons W.T. Cox of Kettering. The enclosing wall and pavement were built by A. Claypole, Builder of Broughton. The total cost was £182 9s 1d (£8,000 today). The memorial was unveiled by Major Thurnburn on Armistice day 1922.

The Memorial is described as “A 2.5 meter high limestone Latin Cross with small wreath carved on the face of the cross head. On the front of the plinth in raised lettering is ... “IN GRATEFUL MEMORY OF THE MEN OF THIS PARISH WHO DIED FOR THEIR COUNTRY 1914-1918”.”

The other three faces record the names of the men who made the ultimate sacrifice:-

Frank Thompson; Horace Sharman; Henry Holland; Oliver Thompson;
Alfred Warner; George Holland; Frank Smith; Walter Moore;
Herbert Ludlow; Samuel Robinson; Alec Stevens; Arthur Busby;
Leonard Carrington; Fred Smith; Bertram Carter; Frank Butler;
Herbert Pymm.

A wreath will be laid on the War Memorial by the Parish Council on behalf of all the residents of the parish.

SCAM MAIL

Royal Mail is seeking to inform everyone in the local community about Scam Mail which is illegal and can cause great distress when it is received.

Typically, scam mail involves professional fraudsters sending convincing letters that are designed to trick people out of money and other valuables. Scam Mail can include bogus competitions and fake prize draws. This mail mostly originates from overseas and is hard to detect.

Royal Mail has taken many measures to deal with this and have to date stopped over 4 million suspected pieces of scam mail at their distribution centres before they can be posted through the letter boxes of customers.
