GREAT CRANSLEY NEIGHBOURHOOD PLAN STEERING GROUP

A quick update on Great Cransley's Neighbourhood Plan ... many thanks to everyone during the door-knocking we carried out recently. It's great to hear so many residents are interested in the plan and want to be kept informed.

We have applied to Locality, an organisation that provides support to neighbourhood planning groups on behalf of the Ministry for Housing, Communities and Local Government, for a grant to help us continue with the plan, and we shall let you know if we are successful. If we are, then we can use part of the grant to pay for a Housing Need Assessment to be carried out, that will tell us exactly what the housing needs are for the village. It would also pay for two traffic census exercises to be carried out, so we have actual evidence about speeding in the village. Keep your fingers crossed we will be successful!

TOWER OPENING, 14TH SEPTEMBER 2019



As part of the Ride & Stride event between Cransley, Mawsley & Broughton, the Cransley Bellringers will be opening the tower up for members of the public. You'll be able to climb the tower, see all six 17th century bells, see what the bell ringers get up to and have a go on a bell (under supervision).

There will be no charge, but we will be asking for donations, which will go towards maintaining the bells and the tower.

Anyone is welcome to climb the tower, provided they have no heart or respiratory conditions, as the climb is quite a long way and a bit dusty.

The Tower will be open 10am to 2pm after which there will be a branch practice from 2pm to 4pm. In this time there will be no climbing the tower, but members of the public are welcome to come and hear/see the ringers in action.

Ultimately they are trying to persuade you to transfer money or give away confidential information.

Vishing is a risk to us all at home and at work. We need to be on our guard every time we answer a call. Please consider the following points:

If you are being asked to provide sensitive information or to complete an action ...

STOP and THINK

Do you know this person, and can you validate and check who they are?

Were you expecting the call?

Never share your payment or bank account details over the phone.

Check them out on an official company web site, and only call numbers from websites you know are genuine.

Call a friend and speak to them before calling back, using a different phone line to ensure the fraudsters aren't intercepting your outgoing calls.

Don't be rushed, if they are genuine they won't mind you checking them out.

NORTHAMPTONSHIRE VILLAGE AWARDS 2019 - GREAT CRANSLEY

Great Cransley did not get an award this year, but Councillors thought everyone would like to read what the judges thought. If anyone has any thoughts on improvements, please let the Parish Council know.

Judges' Comments:

Village Life

Cransley is a small Northamptonshire community, but with a significant number of activities held on a regular basis. Annually there is a Christmas Fair, a Flower Show now in its 76th Year, and a regular Summer event held in the Village Hall. There are also Guides and Brownies meeting in the village hall, a regular sewing group, upholstery group, a bowls group, and other regular activities based at the Village Hall. The key to this success is the cheap hourly rate for the use of the Village Hall, which attracts activities from other communities (such as the Guides, who are from Broughton), but the activities are then generally available and patronized by the residents of Cransley. This facility has provided this small community with activities which otherwise would not be sustainable. The village hall is regulated by a separate village hall committee, which includes some young people. There are also regular church services, and the church bells are rung regularly. Andy's café is run regularly by the church, offering coffee and rolls, and is widely supported.

Because of the size of the community, some activities take place in Broughton, and the nearest shop is in Broughton. New residents are welcomed personally by the Parish Clerk, and given a copy of the village Chronicle as part of a welcome pack.

Community Life

There is a monthly newsletter called the Cransley Chronicle which is distributed free of charge to all households – it is printed by one resident. It is a lively newsletter with activities and Parish Council news. Back copies are on the village website. There is also a good, well placed, notice board.

Village play equipment has been provided in a playground adjacent to the village hall – for the size of the community this is of a high standard and was provided with grant aid from Mick George. Grant aid has also been found for a defibrillator, shortly to be installed in the old telephone box.

For most adult sports facilities (except bowls in the village hall), residents go out of the village.

There is no community car scheme, but residents rely on neighbours – there is also a “Next Door Gt. Cransley” which is a neighbourhood online facility, operated by the Neighbourhood watch coordinator.

A parish plan has been completed, and funding and general assistance is being sought for a Neighbourhood Plan.

Businesses

Cransley is still, to an extent, a farming community, with some employment provided. There is also a recently opened small garden centre outside the village, with other small businesses adjacent such as a smoke house. The village lampposts were repainted, paid for by local sponsorship.

Children and Young People

The provision of play equipment was organised by young mothers in the community. There are no obvious crèches or playgroups in the village, and as there is no village school, all such activities take place out of the village – possibly at Broughton. There are, however, active Guides and Brownies groups, both of which meet weekly in the village hall. The village hall committee has some young people on it, and the parish council has one of the youngest parish councillors.

Older People

There are no designated facilities for older people, but we were told that there is a good amount of neighbourliness, and most people's needs are met by word of mouth or the "Next Door Gt. Cransley" scheme in terms of lifts and general support. Older people in the village have been helping to compile a village history.

Environment and Sustainability

The appearance of the village has been taken seriously over the years, and Victorian style lampposts and traffic calming were the results of a parish plan. The area around the village hall and playground are maintained to a high standard, as are the areas around the war memorial, noticeboard and millennium sculpture.

There are no allotments in the village, but these are available in Broughton. There are regular litter picks, and all fly tipping is regularly reported. There is a map of the local footpaths on the notice board.

Information Technology

For the size of the community the website is very informative and has events, parish council news and village history – there are currently no links to external sources.

Your Village

As a small community, Cransley has a lot to offer, with an attractive well maintained environment, a thriving village hall attracting outside activities, together with longstanding village events. Sadly the village pub has recently closed, but there are high hopes for its continuation as a pub or restaurant.

Current projects include a defibrillator, church clock restoration, war memorial restoration, a neighbourhood plan and an interpretive panel at the millennium sculpture, which is an attractive feature at the entrance to the village.
